

Mike Cahill enters his fourth season as the Head Coach of RIT's Swimming and Diving teams. In 2005-06, he led the men's team to a 7-3 record and produced two All-Americans, diver Quinn Donahoe and sprinter Erik Zelbacher. The women's squad showed marked improvement under Cahill's tutelage.

From 1972 to 2003, Cahill was the Head Varsity and Junior Varsity Swim Coach for both the boy's and girl's swim programs at West Irondequoit High School. During his tenure at West Irondequoit, 14 swimmers were named Monroe County MVP's and eight swimmers earned Outstanding Swimmer of the Section Five Championship Meet honors.

Cahill is the founder of the West Irondequoit Swim Club and works at several swimming camps in the area, including the University of Rochester.

Cahill earned a bachelor's degree in business administration from RIT in 1972. He was a standout swimmer for the Tigers for four seasons. In 1993, Cahill was inducted into the RIT Sports Hall of Fame and in 2002 was inducted to the Aquinas Institute Hall of Fame.

Cahill is the director of the Judson Pool at RIT's Gordon Field House and Activities Center. He lives in West Henrietta with his wife Amy. They have two sons, Chris and Mike.

Lindsay Henahan is entering her third year as an assistant swimming and diving coach at RIT. Henahan, a Rochester native, is a 1999 graduate of West Irondequoit High School, where she swam under Coach Cahill and set eight individual and relay school records. Henahan was a four-time Section V champion in the 100-meter butterfly and set a meet record in 1999 for the

fastest time in that event.

Henahan swam at Division I Washington State University. She currently holds school records for the fastest 100-meter butterfly, 200-meter freestyle relay, and 200 and 400-meter medley relays. In 2003, Henahan finished fifth in the 100-meter butterfly at the Pacific-10 and was ranked 16th overall at the NCAA Championships.

Henahan graduated from Washington State in 2003 with a degree in psychology. In 2003, Henahan spent a year in Phoenix, AZ training for the 2004 U.S. Olympic Trials where she finished 35th in the 100-meter butterfly. At the United States Nationals that August, she finished seventh in the 100-meter butterfly.

Phil Bareleta is entering his second season as an assistant swimming coach at RIT. Bareleta joined the RIT staff after coaching five years at Monroe Community College, where he was the primary coach for the sprinters. During his time at MCC, Bareleta coached several NJCAA All-Americans and Region III champions in the sprint events.

Bareleta has coached in the Rochester area for more than a decade. Prior to coaching at MCC, he served as an assistant swimming coach at Aquinas Institute. He is excited to bring this experience to RIT as the Tigersharks continue their recent success.

Bareleta earned his bachelor's degree in criminology from SUNY Cort-

land in 1994. Bareleta was a standout sprinter for the Red Dragons, helping to lead the squad to the 1993 SUNYAC championship.

Bareleta is a Deputy Sheriff for the Monroe County Sheriff's office. He lives in Henrietta with his wife Michelle and their son, Christopher.

Cliff Devries enters his fifth year as the Diving coach for the Tigersharks. From 1999 to 2002, Devries led RIT on the diving board, earning Upper New York State Athletic Conference Diving Coach of the Year honors in 2000 and 2002.

After a three-year hiatus, Devries returned to lead the Tigershark divers in 2005. Devries has a tremendous amount of experience, having coached in the Rochester area for the last 10 years. Devries began his coaching career at Monroe Community College,

serving as the founder of the Maverick Dive Club. After his stints at MCC and RIT, Devries was the diving coach at the University of Rochester.

Devries graduated from RIT with a bachelor's degree in accounting in 2002.

Men's Swimming and Diving

The 2006-07 RIT men's swimming and diving squad is looking to continue their run as a powerhouse in New York. The Tigersharks will look to duplicate the success they enjoyed in 2005-06 when they finished 7-3 in dual matches. Two-time All-American diver Quinn Donahoe returns, as do a host of athletes who were all-conference selections.

Donahoe, a junior, earned All-American honors for the second straight season, this time on the one-meter board. In 2005, he finished 8th on the three-meter board to earn an All-American honor. Donahoe was selected as the outstanding diver of the meet for the second time at the 2006 NYSCAA Championships. He won 16-of-20 events during the season and now holds all RIT one- and three-meter regular season and championship diving records.

While the men's team will miss Erik Zelbacher, who earned All-American honors and was one of RIT's Senior Athletes of the Year in 2006, several swimmers return who will make a major impact.

Last year Adam Luptak earned second team All-Empire 8 honors in the 200-yard butterfly. Luptak just missed qualifying for the NCAA Tournament. Coach Cahill believes Luptak will have a big season.

Chris Walczyk, Phil Baudoin, Eric Stevens and Brian Duffy return and will be counted on to make strong strides in the 2006-2007 season.

In addition, there will be several talented new faces in the Tigersharks lineup this season, as Coach Cahill has brought in several promising freshmen.

"We are looking for our young swimmers to step up," said Coach Cahill. "They are a talented group of swimmers returning and with an exciting class of newcomers this should be a fun team to watch."

Women's Swimming and Diving

The 2006-07 RIT Women's Swimming and Diving squad will look to continue to the top of the New York State swimming ranks after showing impressive growth in 2005-06. The Tigersharks won four dual matches and had a host of athletes enjoy excellent campaigns.


Leading the way for the Tigersharks will be senior Teresa Burr. Last season Burr won nine races and was a member of several record setting relay teams. Sophomore Kristin Curtze is back after enjoying a tremendous first season for RIT, winning 13 races and earning Empire 8 first and second team honors.

Junior Stephanie Owczarczak will be back in the winter, after she completes a quarter of cooperative education, to lend leadership and experience.

Swimmers Jenn Whigham, Jacqueline McClatchy, and Missy Wilbert each contributed race wins during the 2005-06 season and will return this year to give the Tigers valuable depth.

In addition to the returning swimmers, Coach Cahill is extremely excited about his group of newcomers, as he brings in several swimmers who could emerge right away, including Kurt O'Neill and Caitlyn Burr.

"We have a great recruiting class coming in," said Coach Cahill. "When you add the newcomers to our returning swimmers, our lineup will be revamped and should make for a very exciting season."

For more than a century, the standard for intercollegiate athletics has been established at Rochester Institute of Technology, where student athletes excel in both the classroom and in competition.

U.S. News and World Report has named RIT one of the leading comprehensive universities in the north in terms of academic reputation for more than two decades. RIT's student athletes are no exception.

Last year, student athletes posted a 3.2 grade point average on a 4.0 scale, exceeding the university average of 3.05.

Today, RIT offers 24 varsity sports, including men's and women's cross country, men's and women's crew, men's and women's soccer, women's tennis and women's volleyball in the fall. Winter competition includes men's and women's basketball, men's and women's ice hockey, men's and women's swimming, men's and women's indoor track, and wrestling. Spring competition features baseball, men's and women's crew, men's and women's lacrosse, softball, men's tennis, and men's and women's outdoor track.

Each year, more than 550 student athletes compete on RIT athletics teams. Ten percent of these athletes are hearing-impaired students enrolled in the National Technical Institute for the Deaf, one of RIT's eight colleges.

With the exception of men's ice hockey, which will be playing its second season as a Division I program, RIT is a Division III institution that joined the NCAA in the 1958-59 season. The Tigers compete in the Atlantic Hockey Association, Eastern Collegiate Athletic Conference (ECAC), Empire 8 and New York State Women's Collegiate Athletic

Association (NYSWCAA).

Several student athletes have been recognized for their outstanding achievements. This past season, soccer star Mike Lawson, swimmer Erik Zelbacher and lacrosse standout Dave Thering split the men's Senior Athlete of the Year award, while Christina Anabel of the volleyball team and Pinckney Templeton of the women's lacrosse team garnered the Female Athlete of the Year award.

Lawson enjoyed a banner season, earning his second straight Empire 8 Men's Soccer Player of the Year honor, capping off a career in which he earned All-Conference honors in all four of his seasons at RIT. Lawson, a co-captain, finished second on the team in scoring with 12 points on four goals and four assists. All four of his goals were game-winning tallies.

Eleven of Lawson's 13 career tallies were game-winning goals and his last eight goals were game-winners. In addition, Lawson was named to the Adidas National Soccer Coaches Association of America (NSCAA) Men's College Scholar All-America Team for the second consecutive season. He leaves RIT ranked 20th in career scoring with 40 points on 13 goals and 14 assists.

Zelbacher enjoyed a tremendous final season in the pool, garnering All-American honors in both the 100-yard butterfly and 100-yard freestyle. He had the fastest time in all of Division III this past season in the 50-yard freestyle and 100-yard butterfly. Zelbacher was named the 2006 Empire 8 Swimmer of the Year (2003 and 2005 as well), set three individual RIT records and was part of two relay team records at the 2006 UNYSCSA Championships.

Thering led RIT to a school-record 15 wins in 2006. The Rochester

Area College Athletics and Empire 8

Player of the Year and STIX-USILA first-team All-American selection, totaled 92 points on 33 goals and 59 assists in 18 games for the Tigers, who captured their first Empire 8 title and made the NCAA Division III Men's Lacrosse Championship for the first time since 2000. Thering is the all-time leading scorer in RIT history with 293 points on 147 goals and 146 assists. He also was named a CoSIDA/ESPN The Magazine Second Team At-Large District 1 Academic All-American.

Anabel, an outside hitter, led the Tigers to a 32-8 mark. The Apalachin, N.Y., native was named the Empire 8 Player of the Year. In addition, she was named to the ESPN The Magazine Academic All-District third team. Anabel led RIT with 491 digs and 476 kills. The 2002 Empire 8 Rookie of the Year has earned All-Conference honors in all three of her previous seasons. For her career, Anabel is fifth in kills at RIT with 1,778 and is second in digs with 2,006.

Templeton enjoyed one of the greatest offensive seasons in Tiger history, with record-breaking totals of 58 goals and seven assists for 65 points. She was the first Tiger to score 50 goals or points in a season and became the all-time RIT leader in each category with 133 goals and 154 points. Templeton earned All-Empire 8 second team accolades while leading the Tigers to the NYSWCAA championship game. She also was named a CoSIDA/ESPN The Magazine Second Team At-Large District 1 Academic All-American.



Rochester At A Glance



Rochester city skyline

High-tech industry, entertainment, history and culture, sports and recreation—you'll find it all in Rochester. There are more than a dozen colleges and universities located in the area, where more than 60,000 undergraduate and graduate students call Rochester "home." RIT's 1,300-acre campus is located in the suburbs, about six miles from downtown.

The Genesee River—one of the few north-flowing rivers in the world—cuts through the center of the city, where it tumbles 96 feet at High Falls before flowing into Lake Ontario. The Greater Rochester area is home to more than one million people, making it the third-largest metropolitan area in New York State.

First settled in the early 1800s, Rochester quickly became the largest flour-producing city in the world. Today, the community is frequently labeled the "World's Imaging Center," due in part to the corporate influence of Eastman Kodak, Xerox and Bausch & Lomb. The area is also headquarters to high-profile companies like Wegmans Food Markets, Paychex and Constellation Brands. Local companies export more than \$14 billion in products and services to 165 countries annually—exceeding the exports of 40 other states in the nation.

Explore the Finger Lakes and Lake Ontario

From the wine country of the Finger Lakes (90-plus wineries) to the shores of Lake Ontario, Greater Rochester has a rich and vibrant character. You will find historic architecture, festivals and plenty of shopping, dining and entertainment options throughout the region. If you love the outdoors, there are parks, beaches, golf courses, ski resorts, mountains, gorges, lakes and streams to provide opportunities for recreation and sightseeing. RIT is also a proud partner of the New York Wine & Culinary Center, located in nearby Canandaigua.

A sports town during any season

Rochester is home to several professional sports teams, including the Americans (ice hockey), Red Wings (baseball), Knighthawks (indoor lacrosse) and the Raging Rhinos (soccer). Each summer, the Buffalo Bills training camp comes to town. Rochester is also home to an annual stop on the LPGA tour. World-ranked Oak Hill Country Club also hosted the 2003 PGA Championship and has been the site of many other major golf championships, including the U.S. Open and Ryder Cup.

The editors of *Baseball America* magazine recently voted Rochester the best minor league baseball town in the nation. Fan and community support, a winning tradition and a classic stadium at Frontier Field contributed to this top ranking. Rochester's newest sports venue, PAETEC Park, a 13,500-seat multipurpose stadium, opened in the spring of 2006.



R·I·T *At A Glance*



FOUNDED IN 1829, Rochester Institute of Technology is a privately endowed, coeducational university with eight colleges emphasizing career education and experiential learning.

THE CAMPUS occupies 1,300 acres in suburban Rochester, the third-largest city in New York State.

THE RIT STUDENT BODY consists of approximately 11,400 full-time and 1,600 part-time undergraduate students, and 2,350 graduate students. Enrolled students represent all 50 states and more than 90 foreign countries. RIT is an internationally recognized leader in preparing deaf and hard-of-hearing students for successful careers in professional and technical fields. The university provides unparalleled access and support services for the deaf and hard-of-hearing students who live, study and work with 14,200 hearing students on the RIT campus.

RIT ALUMNI number nearly 100,000 worldwide.

COOPERATIVE EDUCATION provides career-related work experience in many degree programs. RIT has the fourth-oldest and one of the largest cooperative education programs in the world, annually placing 3,300 students in co-op positions with 1,900 employers. More than 600 companies visit RIT annually, conducting more than 7,000 employment interviews.

COLLEGES AND SCHOOLS: Applied Science and Technology; Business; Computing and Information Sciences; Engineering; Imaging Arts and Sciences (School for American Crafts, School of Art, School of Design, School of Film and Animation, School of Photographic Arts and Sciences, School of Print Media); Liberal Arts; National Technical Institute for the Deaf; Science

DEGREES: RIT offers associate degree programs (AS, AOS, AAS), as well as the bachelor of fine arts (BFA), bachelor of science (BS), master of business administration (MBA), master of engineering (ME), master of fine arts (MFA), master of science (MS) and master of science for teachers (MST). Doctoral (Ph.D.) programs are offered in imaging science, microsystems engineering, and computing and information sciences.

WALLACE LIBRARY is a multimedia resource center with a collection of more than 960,000 items. The library subscribes to 145 electronic databases, more than 12,000 electronic journals and more than 18,000 eBooks. Resource materials include 11,000 audio, film and video titles and more than 400,000 books, collected journals and government documents.

HOUSING: More than 6,000 full-time students live in RIT residence halls, apartments, or townhouses on campus. On-campus fraternities, sororities and special-interest houses are also available. Freshmen are guaranteed housing.

STUDENT ACTIVITIES: Major social events and activities are sponsored by the College Activities Board, Residence Halls Association, sororities, fraternities and special-interest clubs of many kinds. There are more than 175 student organizations on campus.

ATHLETICS: RIT offers a wide variety of activities for students at all levels of ability. Men's hockey, basketball, lacrosse, and

women's volleyball and hockey are often ranked nationally. Many other RIT teams receive recognition in the Northeast.
